Spotlight: Hepatitis A

California is experiencing the largest person-to-person outbreak of Hepatitis A in the United States since the introduction of the Hepatitis A vaccine in 1996. Since the outbreak began in 2017, the California Department of Public Health (CDPH) has reported a total of 703 Hepatitis A cases, 460 hospitalizations and 21 deaths that occurred primarily in San Diego, Los Angeles, Monterey and Santa Cruz counties (as of 3/23/18). Fresno County has had 10 confirmed cases (from Jan 2017 - Mar 2018) of Hepatitis A and currently does not have any Hepatitis A cases associated with this outbreak.

Hepatitis A is caused by a virus and symptoms of infection can include: fever, fatigue, poor appetite, nausea, vomiting, abdominal pain, dark urine, joint pain and jaundice. The Hepatitis A virus usually spreads when a person ingests the virus from objects or food contaminated by stool from an infected person. Most people who get Hepatitis A will recover from their illness and death rarely occurs. Those that do die from a Hepatitis A infection usually have underlying liver disease and/or are older aged. Risk factors for infection include:

- Traveling to areas where hepatitis A is common
- Men who have sex with men
- Injection and non-injection drug use
- Being homeless

The Hepatitis A vaccine is nearly 100% effective after completing the necessary doses and is the best way to prevent illness. The Fresno County Department of Public Health provides the Hepatitis A vaccine and can be reached at (559) 600-3550. Other important prevention measures include proper hand washing with soap and water after using the restroom, changing diapers and before eating or preparing food.

Definitions

- Communicable disease a disease which can be transmitted directly or indirectly by a living organism or by a non-living object or substance. Examples include: from an infected person to another person who is susceptible; from an object (sheets, clothing, telephone handset, drinking glass) that may harbor germs to a susceptible person.
