#### IV. Recognize April as Autism Awareness Month

Guest Speaker; Melissa Rose, Autism Specialist Credentialed School Psychologist

Although Autism is a developmental disorder, it effects the behavioral health of individuals living with autism and those who care for them. The BHB members wanted to take the opportunity to recognize April as Autism Awareness and Acceptance Month and invited Melissa Rose to share some of her knowledge with them. Melissa is a Board-certified school psychologist and Behavioral Analyst for Fresno County Superintendent of Schools who has spent 17 years of specializing in autism spectrum disorder and has been a long-standing member of (CAPTAIN) California Autism Professional training and information network. #### V. Department of Behavioral Health Update Dawan Utecht, Director

Director Dawan Utecht began with the Departments Mission, Vision and Goals and went on to mention that April is Alcohol and Stress Awareness month. She also mentioned the continued focus on racism as a public health crisis, highlighting "Stop Asian Hate".

#### COVID -19 Trends

Fresno County is now in the orange tier with over 100,000 cases and 1,600 deaths. About 33 % of Fresno county's entire population has been vaccinated. 226,693 individuals have been fully vaccinated and 124,693 partially. There has been a small increase in the number of adult mental health services provided as well as the number of persons served from 2019 to the present. The department recognizes the data as an impact of COVID and the mental health of those in the community as well as the Departments ability to ensure access to these individuals who need services.

D. Review of Innovation Plans Submitted for Review: Suicide Prevention Follow-up Call Program and California Reducing Disparities Project (CRDP) Evaluation

#### New Submissions of Suicide Prevention Follow-up Call Program MHSA Innovations Project

- Goal to serve 1,800-3,600 persons
- Innovation to learn through follow-up phone calls to persons who have experienced suicidal ideation
- Inform prevention efforts of the triggers and factors leading to ideation

#### California Reducing Disparities Project (CRDP) Evaluation

- To serve 900 unduplicated persons
- Seek to understand community defined practices under the CRDP through community input to adapt and align with MHSA funding without compromising effectiveness
- E. Outcomes Report on Uplift Family Services Fresno HOPE program
  - Provides specialty mental health services and court-specific services
  - Unique individuals served 1,121
  - Services rendered 22,157
  - Cost per person served \$3,616 per unique client
  - Staff 1 Clinical Director, 6 Program Managers, 20 Clinicians and 5 Family Specialists

#### HOPE program response to COVID Pandemic beginning March 2020

- All services transitioned to telehealth
- All in-person trainings were canceled, and virtual trainings began FY 2020 21
- Staff turnover
  - The convenience of Telehealth allowed Clinicians who previously traveled to clients, the ability to add clients to their caseload and pick up any slack from staff turnover
- F. Report on Marketing Campaigns and Outcomes presented by JP Marketing

Representative for JP Marketing presented a large amount of information on the many projects they are involved in with the Department as well as information on the general support they provide with public outreach. A campaign timeline was presented in addition to the following:





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
## When is Autism recognized?




