Popups will happen virtually every second and fourth Wednesday of the month, beginning June  $23^{rd}$  from 4:00 - 6:00 PM.

# V. Department of Behavioral Health Update Dawan Utecht, Director

Director Utecht recognized, June as Pride Month mentioning a list of activities put on by the Department in support of the LGBQT community. She also highlighted that the city of Fresno raised its Pride Flag and

presented some Department employees with a Harvey Milk award for their commitment, support, and action in the LGBTQ+ community. Lastly stated was that this week in June 1865, Juneteenth became recognized as the end of slavery in the United States.

## **B.** Quarterly Housing Report

<u>Agreement with Exodus Recovery Housing for Supportive Services</u> was Executed by the Board of Supervisors on March 23, 2021 and amended on May 25, 2021 to now include the following sites:

- Villages at Paragon
- Renaissance Properties
- Villages at Broadway

The sites are set to begin services July 1, 2021. Additional No Place Like Home (NPLH) sites will be added as needed.

# Projects for Assistance in Transition from Homelessness (PATH) Grant Application

- Board date 6/22/2021
- Target Population Adults experiencing or at risk of experiencing homelessness and have a serious mental illness (SMI) or co-occurring disorder
- Grant Allocation -\$317,162

#### Independent Living Association (ILA) – Operator Improvement Program

- The ILA supports independent living operators, tenants, and the community by promoting high quality independent living (formerly known as room and board)
- Currently discussing DBH providing limited dollars to ILA operators for home repairs

# State Update - Cal AIM

A Brief update was provided on Cal AIM, which is an effort by the state to improve MediCal. The goal is to implement the change by January 2022. In terms of Behavioral Health, it involves the following:

# C. Outcomes Report for Crestwood Behavioral Health Kingsburg Healing Center

The Center provides support for clients to recover with enhanced sense of resilience, through a wide range of wellness tools and staff support to restore a sense of hope, empowerment, and community support. Another goal is realizing the potential in each client and psychiatric stabilization.

- Adult clients age 18 65 living with severe and persistent mental health conditions
